




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San Francisco State Senior Exit Survey

Introduction

The Senior Exit Survey is conducted by the Office of Institutional Research (IR) at San Francisco State University to provide institutional performance assessment of San Francisco State's undergraduate program. The survey is intended to facilitate evaluation of the level of students' satisfaction with their San Francisco State experience as a whole and with their major program, their involvement with academic, campus or community activities, the improvement of their intellectual abilities, and their personal and social development in other areas. Students are administered the survey online and must proceed through it in order to reach the undergraduate application for graduation. The only survey question that must be completed, however, is the request for their student identification number, the validity of which is not confirmed at that time. Usable responses to the survey questions were obtained from 5,266 undergraduates submitting graduation application between January 1st, 2016 and December 31st, 2016.

Executive Summary

In general, responses were similar to those of the last Senior Exit Survey data collection period. A total of 32% of students indicated that they will <u>not</u> have graduated in the time they expected, which is nine percentage points *lower* than the previous reporting period. The top three reasons students indicated that they will not have graduated in the time expected included: 1. Lack of availability of courses (40%), 2. Financial pressure or the need to work (18%), and 3. Change in major or indecision about a major (17%). Although lack of availability of courses continued to be the highest area of dissatisfaction, this is six percentage points lower than the previous reporting period.

Compared to the previous reporting period, students reported higher rates of satisfaction with San Francisco State's contribution to various areas of their personal and social development. A total of 60% of students reported that San Francisco State contributed to their development of leadership skills to a considerable or great extent, four percentage points higher than the previous reporting period. Seventy-seven percent of students reported that San Francisco State contributed to learning effectively on their own, two percentage points higher than the previous reporting period. Sixty percent of students reported that San Francisco State contributed to their commitment to social justice, two percentage points higher than the previous reporting period. Fifty-four percent of students reported that San Francisco State contributed to their to civic engagement, two percentage points higher than the previous reporting period.

A total of 48% of students reported taking an online course in their major, which is consistent with the previous reporting period. Of the students who reported dissatisfaction with online courses taken in their major, the top three areas of dissatisfaction included: 1. Too little

interaction with course instructor and/or instructor was not sufficiently responsive (20%), 2. Course and course materials were not well organized (16%), and 3. Course was not as rigorous as a face-to-face course (14%). Students who reported that there was too little interaction with course instructor and/or instructor was not sufficiently responsive is down six percentage points compared with the previous reporting period.

Nearly eight in ten students (79%) indicated that they would recommend San Francisco State to their friends, this is up four percentage points over the reporting period. The top three plans upon graduation included: 1. Employment (67%), 2. Graduate Study (22%), and 3. Volunteer Service (2%). These findings are consistent with the previous reporting period.

Responses for Each Survey Question

Presented below for each question is the distribution of responses by all who answered each survey question. Also reported are any statistically significant differences¹ in responses between groups of students by demographic category². Appendix A provides tables of the frequencies and percentages of survey responses by all respondents combined. Tables presenting frequencies and percentages of responses by demographics, (i.e., by age group, sex, race/ethnicity, college of major, and geographic origin) for each question are available upon request from <u>eshindle@sfsu.edu</u>. Overall San Francisco State Experience

Will you have graduated in the time you expected?

A little over three in ten respondents (32%) indicated that they will <u>not</u> have graduated in the time expected. This rate is 9 percentage points lower than the previous reporting periods.

There was a statistically significant association between age group and graduation expectation: specifically, students 25 and over were significantly more likely than students 24 and under to indicate that they would graduate in the time expected. There was a statistically significant

association between race/ethnicity and graduation expectation: specifically, White students were more likely than Latino/a students to indicate that they would graduate in the time expected. There was a statistically significant association between college and graduation expectation: specifically students majoring within the College of Liberal and Creative Arts were significantly more likely to indicate that they would graduate in the time expected compared with students majoring in other colleges.

If you will not have graduated in the time you expected, what is the main reason why not?

Four in ten respondents (40%) experiencing a delay in graduation, attributed it to a lack of availability of courses, down six percentage points from the last reporting period.

Students 25 years of age and over were significantly more likely than were students 24 years of age and under to cite financial pressure/need to work, having to take one or more semesters off, or family responsibilities as the main reason for not graduating in the time expected. Students 24 years of age and under were significantly more likely than were students 25 years of age and over to cite lack of availability of courses or change in major/indecision about major as the main reason for not graduating in the time expected. Asian students were significantly more likely than White students to cite lack of availability of courses as the primary reason for not graduating in the time expected. Respondents majoring within the College of Liberal and Creative Arts were significantly *less* likely than were those majoring in another college to attribute their prolonged studies to a lack of availability of courses.

Would you recommend San Francisco State to your friends?

A total of 79% respondents indicated that they would recommend San Francisco State to their friends. This result is up four percentage points from the last reporting period but roughly the same as in earlier reporting periods.

A recommendation of San Francisco State to their friends was significantly more likely to be made by students 25 and over than by students 24 and under. Latino/a students were significantly more likely than were Asian, White, and Two or more students to recommend San Francisco State to their friends. Additionally, students identifying as Black/African American were significantly more likely than were White or Two or more students to recommend San Francisco State to their friends. Students majoring within the College of Liberal and Creative Arts were significantly more likely to recommended San Francisco State than students majoring within the College of Science and Engineering. Respondents from Southern California were significantly *less* likely than were those from the bay area and all other areas to recommend San Francisco State to friends.

Is there at least one member of the SF State faculty or staff that you consider your mentor?

More than six in ten respondents (66%) indicated that they have a mentor. This is an increase of two percentage points from the last reporting period.

Female students were significantly more likely than were male students to indicate that there is at least one member of the San Francisco faculty or staff that they consider their mentor. Students with a major in the College of Business were significantly *less* likely than were students with majors in the other colleges to have a mentor at San Francisco.

Choose the category of the one thing that, if changes were made, would have improved your overall SF State experience the most.

The top three changes students reported that would have improved their overall San Francisco State experience were course availability (37%), advising (18%), and financial concerns or cost of attendance (11%). This is consistent with earlier reports.

Students 24 and under were significantly more likely than were students 25 and over to indicate that campus life and course availability would have improved their San Francisco State experience most. On the other hand, students 25 and over were significantly more likely than were students 24 and under to indicate that instruction/teaching would have improved their San Francisco State experience most.

Female students were significantly more likely than male students to indicate that advising and financial concerns/cost of attendance would have improved their San Francisco State experience. Conversely, males were significantly more likely than female students to indicate campus facilities would have improved their San Francisco State experience most.

Students identifying as Asian were significantly more likely than were students identifying as White and Latino/a to indicate course availability would have improved their San Francisco State experience most. Students identifying as Latino/a or White were significantly more likely than were students identifying as Asian to indicate that advising would have improved their San Francisco State experience. Additionally, Latino/a students were significantly more likely than were Asian students to cite financial concerns/cost of attendance would have improved their San Francisco State experience.

Students majoring within the College of Business were significantly more likely than students majoring in Health and Social Sciences or Liberal and Creative Arts to indicate that course availability would have improved their San Francisco State experience. Liberal and Creative Arts majors were significantly more likely than were students majoring within the College of Business or the College of Health and Social Sciences to indicate that advising would have improved their San Francisco State experience.

Students from the Bay Area were significantly more likely than students from other institutions to indicate that course availability would have improved their San Francisco State experience most. Students from Southern California were significantly more likely than students from the

Bay Area and other areas that campus life would have improved their San Francisco State Experience most.

Satisfaction with Your Major Program

Please indicate your level of satisfaction with each of the following aspects of your major:

Quality of teaching in your major

Eight in ten respondents expressed satisfaction (82%), which is consistent with earlier reports.

Asian students expressed significantly *less* satisfaction with the quality of teaching in their major as compared with White, Latino/a, and Two or more students. Business majors indicated significantly *less* satisfaction with quality of teaching than students in other colleges. Science and Engineering majors indicated significantly *less* satisfaction with quality of teaching than students majoring in Health and Social Sciences and Liberal and Creative Arts.

Accessibility of faculty in your major

Nearly eight in ten respondents expressed satisfaction (78%), which is consistent with earlier reports.

Asian students expressed significantly *less* satisfaction of accessibility of faculty than Latina/o or White students. Liberal and Creative Arts majors as well as Health and Social Science majors expressed significantly greater satisfaction with accessibility of faculty in their majors compared to students majoring in Science and Engineering or Business.

Faculty interest in your academic success in your major

Three quarters of the respondents expressed satisfaction. This is consistent with earlier reports.

Asian students expressed significantly *less* satisfaction with faculty interest in their academic success than Latina/o or White students. Liberal and Creative Arts and Health and Social Sciences majors expressed significantly greater satisfaction with this than did students with majors in Business or Science and Engineering.

Academic rigor of classes in your major

Slightly more than three quarters of the respondents expressed satisfaction. This is consistent with earlier reports.

Female students expressed significantly greater satisfaction with the academic rigor as opposed to males. Liberal and Creative Arts majors as well as Health and Social Science majors expressed significantly greater satisfaction with the academic rigor of classes in their major than did students having majors in Business or Science and Engineering.

Quality of academic advising by faculty in your major

Two thirds expressed satisfaction. This is consistent with earlier reports.

Liberal and Creative Arts majors as well as Health and Social Science majors expressed significantly greater satisfaction with the quality of academic advising by faculty in their major than did students majoring in Business or Science and Engineering.

Online Courses in Your Major Program

Did you take any online courses in your major?

Nearly half of the respondents indicated that they took an online course, consistent with the previous reporting period.

Asian students were significantly more likely to take an online course in their major compared with Latino/a or White students. Business majors were significantly more likely than were students in other colleges to report taking online courses in their major. Students from the Bay Area were significantly more likely to take an online course in their major compared with students from other areas (not including Southern California).

Please indicate your level of satisfaction with the online courses you took in your major.

Two thirds of the respondents expressed satisfaction. This is consistent with the previous reporting period.

Students 24 and under were significantly *less* satisfied than students over 25 with online courses in their major. Students from Southern California were significantly *less* satisfied than students from the Bay Area with online courses taken in their major.

What was the main reason you were dissatisfied with online coursework in your major?

The main reason for one quarter of the respondents who took online courses in their major was that there was too little interaction with the course instructor and/or that the instructor was not sufficiently responsive. Although this is the main reason for dissatisfaction with online coursework, it is down six percentage points from one year ago. The second-most frequently provided reason was that the course and course materials were not well organized. This is up five percentage points from the previous reporting period.

There were no significant differences between groups of respondents on the basis of any of the demographic categories included in the analysis.

Internship or field experience that was not required by your major

More than one third indicated that they participated. This is consistent with earlier reports.

Students 24 and under were significantly more likely to report participation in an internship/field experience than were students 25 years of age and over. African American students were significantly more likely to report participation in an internship/field experience than Asian students. Students majoring in Health and Social Sciences or Liberal and Creative Arts were significantly more likely to participate in an internship or field experience as compared to students majoring in Business. Students from Southern California were significantly more likely to participate than students from the Bay Area and other areas.

Study abroad

Less than one in ten respondents indicated that they participated. This is consistent with earlier reports.

Students 24 and under were significantly more likely to report participation in a study abroad than were students 25 years of age and over. Female students were significantly more likely to report participation in a study abroad than male students. Two or more students were significantly more likely to participate in a study abroad than Latino/a students. Students from the Bay Area were significantly *less* likely than were students from Southern California and other areas to report participation in a study abroad.

Culminating senior experience (e.g., comprehensive exam, capstone course, thesis/senior project, student teaching, etc.)

One third of the respondents indicated that they participated. This is up two percentage points from the previous earlier reports.

Male students reported significantly higher participation in a culminating senior experience than female students. White students were significantly more likely to participate in a culminating senior experience than Asian students. Health and Social Sciences majors reported significantly more participation (and Business majors significantly *less* participation) in a culminating senior experience than did students in other colleges.

Community service or volunteer work

A little *less* than four in ten respondents reported a moderate or high level of participation. This is slightly lower than previous reports.

A significantly higher level of involvement in community service or volunteer work was reported by students 24 years of age and under and female students than by students 25 and over and male students. White students reported significantly *less* involvement in community service or volunteer work than did African American, Asian, or Latino/a students. Health and Social Sciences majors reported significantly more participation than did students having majors in other colleges. Students from the Bay Area reported significantly lower levels of participation in community service or volunteer work than students from Southern California or other areas.

Work on a research project with a faculty member

A little *less* than two thirds of respondents reported no participation, consistent with the last August to January reporting period.

Asian students reported significantly greater participation than did White students. Business majors and Liberal and Creative Arts majors indicated that they participated in work on research projects with faculty significantly *less* frequently than did students majoring in Health and Social Sciences or Science and Engineering. Students from the Bay Area reported significantly lower levels of participation than students from other areas (outside of Southern California).

Student organizations

A little over three in ten respondents reported a moderate or high level of participation, while nearly five in ten reported none. This is similar to earlier reporting periods.

Students 24 and under reported significantly more involvement in student organizations than did those 25 and over. Asian students reported significantly higher levels of participation in student organizations than White students. Liberal and Creative Science majors reported significantly *less* participation in student organizations than did students with majors in Business or Health and Social Sciences. Bay area students reported significantly *less* participation compared to students from Southern California or other areas.

Extracurricular athletic or physical recreation activities

More than two in ten respondents reported a moderate or high level of participation, while six in ten reported none. This is similar to earlier reporting periods.

Reported involvement in extracurricular athletic or physical recreation activities was significantly greater among students 24 years of age and under than among students 25 and over, greater among male students than female students, and greater among Asian students than White students. Liberal and Creative Science majors reported significantly *less* participation in extracurricular athletic or physical recreation activities than did students with majors from other colleges.

Six in ten respondents reported considerable or great improvement, similar to the last reporting period.

Students 25 and over reported significantly greater improvement in quantitative reasoning than students 24 years of age and under. Latino/a students reported significantly greater improvement in this than did Asian or White students.

Writing

Two thirds of the respondents reported considerable or great improvement. This is consistent with the previous reporting periods.

Female students reported significantly more improvement in their writing skills than did males. Latino/a students reported significantly more improvement in their writing skills than did White, Asian, or Two or more students. Liberal and Creative Arts and Health and Social Sciences majors reported significantly more improvement in writing than did students having majors in Business or Science and Engineering.

Oral communication

Seven in ten respondents reported considerable or great improvement. This is consistent with earlier reports.

Female students reported significantly more improvement in oral communication skills than did males. Latino/a reported significantly more improvement in their oral communication skills than Asian or White students. Science and Engineering students reported significantly *less* improvement in this area than did students in the other colleges.

Critical thinking (e.g., evaluating the truth of evidence or arguments, reasoning clearly and accurately, solving non-mathematical problems, drawing logical conclusions)

Over three quarters of the respondents reported considerable or great improvement, consistent with the previous reporting periods.

Females reported significantly more improvement in critical thinking skills than did males. Latino/a students reported significantly more improvement in their critical thinking skills than did Asian, White, or Two or more students. Students with majors in Health and Social Sciences or Liberal and Creative Arts reported significantly more improvement in critical thinking skills than students with majors in Business or Science and Engineering.

Information literacy (e.g., finding, evaluating, and using information in various forms, information research skills, fact checking, distinguishing fact from opinion)

Three quarters of the respondents reported considerable or great improvement. This is similar to earlier reports.

Latino/a students reported significantly more improvement in information literacy than did Asian or White students. Business majors reported significantly *less* improvement in information literacy than did students with majors in other areas. Additionally, students with majors in Science and Engineering reported significantly *less* improvement in information literacy than did students with majors in Health and Social Sciences or Liberal and Creative Arts.

Exposure to cultures or groups different from your own

Seven in ten respondents reported considerable or great contribution. This is consistent with the previous reporting period, but up two percentage points from the report prior.

Students 24 years of age and under and females reported a significantly greater contribution by San Francisco State to their exposure to cultures or groups different from their own than did students 25 years of age and older and male students. Latino/a students reported significantly greater contribution in this than students identifying as Asian, White, or Two or more. Students with majors in Liberal and Creative Arts reported significantly greater contributions in this than students or Science and Engineering. Bay area students indicated that their San Francisco State experience did this to a significantly *lower* extent than did students from Southern California or other areas.

Awareness of the ethical implications of your own and others' actions

More than seven in ten respondents reported considerable or great contribution. This is consistent with the previous reporting period, but up three percentage points from the report prior.

Students 24 years of age and under and females reported a significantly greater contribution to their awareness of the ethical implications of their own and others' actions than did students 25

years of age and over and males. Latino/a students reported a significantly greater contribution to this than did Asian, White, or Two or more students. Business or Science and Engineering majors indicated a significantly *smaller* contribution to this than did students with majors in Health and Social Sciences or Liberal and Creative Arts. Students from the Bay Area indicated a significantly *smaller* contribution to this than did students or other areas.

Acquiring a broad general education

Seven in ten respondents reported considerable or great contribution. This is consistent with previous reporting periods.

Students 24 years of age and under and females indicated that their San Francisco State experience contributed to the acquisition of a broad general education to a significantly greater extent than did students 25 and over and males. Latino/a students reported that their San Francisco State experience contributed to this to a significantly greater extent than did Asian, White, or Two or more students. Students with majors in Business or Science and Engineering reported that their San Francisco State experience contributed to this to a significantly descer extent than their San Francisco State experience contributed to this to a significantly reported that their San Francisco State experience contributed to this to a significantly lesser extent than students with majors in Health and Social Sciences or Liberal and Creative Arts.

Development of leadership skills

Students 24 years of age and under and females indicated that their San Francisco State experience contributed to the development of leadership skills to a significantly greater extent than did students 25 and over and males. Latino/a students reported a significantly greater contribution by their San Francisco State experience to this than did Asian, White, or Two or more students. Science and Engineering majors indicated a significantly *smaller* contribution by San Francisco State to this than did students in the other colleges. Liberal and Creative Arts majors reported a significantly smaller contribution by San Francisco State to this than did students with majors in Health and Social Sciences.

Learning effectively on your own

A little over three quarters of respondents reported considerable or great contribution. This is up two percentage points from the previous reporting period.

Students 24 years of age and under and females indicated that their San Francisco State experience contributed to learning effectively on their own to a significantly greater extent than students 25 and over and males. Latino/a students reported a significantly greater contribution by San Francisco State to this than did Asian or White students. Students with majors in Business indicated that their San Francisco State experience contributed to learning effectively on their own to a significantly *lesser* extent than students with majors in Health and Social Sciences or Liberal and Creative Arts.

Commitment to social justice

Six in ten respondents reported considerable or great contribution. This is two percentage points higher than the previous two reporting periods.

Students 24 years of age and under and female students reported a significantly greater contribution by their San Francisco State experience to their commitment to social justice than did students 25 and over and male students. Latino/a students reported a significantly greater contribution by San Francisco State to this than did Asian, White, and Two or more students. Liberal and Creative Arts and Health and Social Sciences students reported a significantly greater contribution to this than did those having majors in Business or Science and Engineering. Students from Southern California reported a significantly greater contribution by San Francisco State to the Bay Area.

Commitment to civic engagement

More than half of the respondents reported considerable or great contribution, two percentage points higher than the previous reporting period but roughly the same as the report prior.

Female students and Latino/a students reported a significantly greater contribution by San Francisco State to this than did males or Asian, White, or Two or more students. Health and Social Sciences and Liberal and Creative Arts students reported a significantly greater contribution to this than did those having majors in Business or Science and Engineering. Students from Southern California reported a significantly greater contribution to this than did students from the Bay Area.

Your Post-Graduation Plans

What is most likely to be your principle activity upon graduation?

Nearly seven in ten respondents indicated that they will most likely be employed and two in ten respondents indicating plans to attend graduate studies following graduation. This is consistent with the previous reporting periods.

Students 24 years of age and under were significantly more likely than students 25 and over to indicate that they plan to engage in volunteer service upon graduation. On the other hand, students 25 and over were significantly more likely to indicate that they plan to start or raise a family upon graduation. Female students were significantly more likely than were males or students of other race/ethnicity categories to indicate that they plan to engage in graduate study upon graduation. Male students were significantly more likely than females to indicate that employment or entering the military would be their most probable activity upon graduation. Asian students were significantly *less* likely than were students of other race/ethnicity categories to indicate study. Business majors were significantly more likely than were students with other majors to indicate that employment would be their most probable activity upon graduation, while students with majors in Health and Social Sciences, Liberal and Creative Arts, and Science and Engineering were significantly more likely to indicate that graduate study would be their most probable activity upon likely to indicate that graduate study upon graduation.

Discussion

In general, responses were similar with those discussed in earlier Senior Exit Survey reports. Although 79% of the respondents indicated that they would recommend San Francisco State to their friends, three in ten indicated that they would not be graduating in the time they expected. Four in ten of those students attributed the delay to a lack of availability of courses. However, it is important to note that this is down four percentage points from the previous reporting period.

Satisfaction with **major programs** was high, with more than three quarters of respondents expressing satisfaction with the quality of teaching, accessibility of faculty, faculty interest in academic success, and academic rigor of courses. There was slightly lower levels of satisfaction with the quality of academic advising by faculty and online courses than there was about other aspects of the students' major program. Students having majors in Health and Social Sciences and Liberal and Creative Arts consistently reported significantly greater satisfaction with their major program than did students with majors in Business or Science and Engineering.

Reported involvement in various **academic, campus, and community activities** ranged from a low of 7% in study abroad to a high of 38% in community service or volunteer work. Students 24 and under reported higher participation than students 25 and over in the following activities: internships and or field experience, study abroad, community service or volunteer work, student organizations, and extracurricular athletic and/or physical activities. Students with majors in Health and Social Sciences reported significantly higher levels of participation than students with majors in other colleges in the following activities: culminating senior experience and community service and/or volunteer work. Students from Southern California reported significantly higher levels of participation than students with students from the Bay Area in the following activities: internship, study abroad, community service or volunteer work, and student organizations.

At least six in ten respondents reported that their **intellectual abilities** improved to a considerable or great extent during their San Francisco State enrollment. Latino/a students were significantly more likely than were Asian or White students to report considerable or great improvement in the areas of quantitative reasoning, writing, oral communication, critical thinking, and information literacy.

The extent to which the San Francisco State experience contributed to **personal or social development** varied by area, but students ages 24 and under, females, and Latino/a students reported San Francisco State's contribution to their exposure to cultures or groups different than own, awareness of the ethical implications of their own and others' actions, acquiring a broad general education, development of leadership skills, learning effectively on their own, and commitment to social justice to a significantly greater extent than students 25 and over, males, and Asian or White students, respectively.
